




▲ Trade Composition (2024)





A Attractions in Phnom Penh and Surrounding Areas



The Royal Palace is a complex of buildings which serves as the royal residence of the king of Cambodia. The complex includes the Silver Pagoda, the Khemarin Palace, the Throne Hall and the Inner Court.



The National Museum contains the world's largest collection of Khmer arts including sculptures, ceramics, bronze and ethnographic objects dating from prehistoric times before, during and after the Khmer empire.

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A Attractions in Phnom Penh and Surrounding Areas



Oudong Mountain used to be a royal residence and Cambodia's capital from 1618 to 1866. Today, Oudong has become a highly sacred place after the relic of Preah Serei Roek Theat (ashes of Buddha) was moved here from Phnom Penh.



On the way to Tonle Bati, you can find two Angkorian era temples including Ta Prohm and Yeay Peau which were built by King Jayavarman VII in the late 12th century in the same period that Angkor Thom and the Bayon temple were constructed.



Wat Phnom was built in 1373 and stands 27 meters above the ground and is the central point of the capital. The site may give you a feeling that you're in a medieval place and the interior has a central altar complex with a large bronze seated Buddha surrounded by other statues and items of devotion and worship.



This monument was built in 1958 to mark Cambodia's independence from France in 1953. The monument is the centre of national ceremonies where soldiers march before the stupa to commemorate service men and women who gave their lives for the country.

Cultural Attractions



Built in the 12th century by King Suryavarman II, Angkor Wat Temple is the most famous of all Angkorian temples. Originally dedicated to the Hindu god Vishnu, it was later converted to Buddhism and remains the only Angkorian temple in continuous religious use.



The Bayon Temple is a richly decorated Khmer temple built in the late 12th century. Bayon's most distinctive feature is the multitude of serene and massive stone faces on the many towers that jut from the upper terrace and cluster around its center park.



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& Cultural Attractions



Banteay Srei, built in the 10th century, means 'Citadel of Women'. Made from red sandstone, many of its elements are in miniature form, making it unique among Angkorian temples. Its intricate carvings, still visible today, make it a popular site and have earned it praise as a 'precious gem' or 'jewel of Khmer art'.



This now ruined complex dates back to the Pre-Angkorian Chenla Kingdom from the late 6th century to the 9th century. It was established by King Isanavarman I in the early 7th century as a central royal sanctuary and capital where the site served as an important religious centre for the worship of Shiva as one of the two leading gods of Hinduism.



Koh Ker was the capital of the Khmer Empire under King Jayavarman IV in the early 10th century. Though now in ruins and more remote than other sites, it once featured grand Hindu temples, shrines, monuments, and advanced water systems. The complex reflects the brief yet ambitious reign of a powerful king.



Ta Prohm, built in the late 12th century in the Bayon style, was originally a Mahayana Buddhist monastery and university. Unlike most Angkorian temples, it has been left largely as it was found. The striking mix of trees growing from the ruins and dense jungle surroundings makes it one of Angkor's most popular temples.



This Khmer temple is situated spectacularly atop of a 525-metre cliff in the Dangrek Mountains located in the Preah Vihear province. It is a Hindu temple dedicated to Shiva and was built during the Khmer Empire.



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▲ Coastal Attractions



Koh Rong Island is one of the most gorgeous and loveliest islands in the Cambodia Bay which is located 25 km off the coast of Preah Sihanouk province. Its white sand beaches and turquoise water makes this place a dreamy tropical paradise.



Located nearly 38 km east of Kampot—a town known for its colonial charm and pepper plantations—Kampong Trach is home to striking limestone formations and hidden caves scattered across a lush, peaceful countryside. The area offers a scenic escape and a glimpse into Cambodia's natural beauty.



Koh Sdach, or "King Island," is a small island off the coast of Koh Kong Province, known for its bustling fishing village, rocky coastline, and vibrant coral reefs. It offers a unique blend of island life and local culture, where visitors can explore nearby islets, dive among colorful marine life, and experience the rhythms of a close-knit coastal community.



Tatai, in Koh Kong Province, is a peaceful riverside escape surrounded by rainforest and mangroves. Known for its waterfalls and scenic river cruises, it offers a mix of adventure and relaxation. Visitors can kayak, birdwatch, or stay in eco-lodges floating gently on the water—all while enjoying the natural beauty of Cambodia's southwest.



Kep is a relaxing seaside province situated 168 km from Phnom Penh. Besides being known for its beaches, Kep is known for its salt and pepper but is best known particularly for its crabs. This coastal province is perceived as one of the 'must visits'.



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▲ Eco-tourism Attractions



Rattanakiri is renowned for its unique natural beauty and wealth of natural resources. The undulating hills and mountains, plateaus, watershed lowlands, clear crater lakes, rivers and beautiful waterfalls form an impressive itinerary of intriguing destinations for eco-tourism.



Mondulkiri literally means 'Meeting of the Hills'. It is one of the most popular destinations for eco-tourism in Cambodia. The land is very rich in natural resources especially hard minerals such as gold and gems which can be found in all five districts of the province. Furthermore, this place is known for its forested hills and beautiful waterfalls.



This waterfall is the biggest waterfall along the Mekong river in Cambodia. This amazing waterfall never ceases to mesmerize visitors. The stretch of the mighty Mekong is also a great place to observe the very rare Irrawaddy dolphins.



Kratie is a relatively quiet town that is located on the east bank of the Mekong river. A great reason to explore this pleasant town is the possibility to view the local freshwater Irrawaddy dolphin population. It is easy to see the dolphins by taking a 25 minute boat ride that also makes it possible to admire the authentic life of the local Cambodians.



Bokor National Park in Kampot Province is a highland retreat known for its cool climate, misty forests, and rich biodiversity. The park features diverse wildlife, hidden waterfalls, and remnants of a former hill station, offering a blend of nature and history that appeals to both explorers and leisure travelers.



Boeng Kayak Mangrove Forest in Koh Kong Province is a peaceful natural haven where winding wooden walkways lead through dense mangroves and calm waterways. Ideal for kayaking and birdwatching, the area offers a quiet escape into one of Cambodia's most important coastal ecosystems, rich in biodiversity and local conservation efforts.

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
Festivals



Cambodia's most important holiday, Khmer New Year is a vibrant three-day celebration in April marking the end of the harvest season. It features family gatherings, temple visits, traditional games, and festive rituals.



A major religious festival honoring ancestors, during which Cambodians visit pagodas to offer food and prayers for their departed loved ones. It marks the end of the 15-day Dak Ben period, when people traditionally visit at least seven pagodas to make offerings.



Preah Reach Pithi Chrat Preah Nengkal, or the Royal Ploughing Ceremony, is an ancient tradition held each May to bless the rice farming season. Sacred oxen are used to predict the year's agricultural outlook in the presence of the King.



Bon Om Touk, or the Cambodian Water Festival, celebrates the reversal of the Tonle Sap River. Held on the full moon of Kadeuk, it marks the end of the rainy season with thrilling boat races by day and illuminated floats and fireworks by night.

A Intangible Cultural Heritage



The Royal Ballet of Cambodia, a classical Khmer dance form practiced for over a thousand years, is renowned for its elegant movements, elaborate costumes, and intricate hand gestures. Often portraying mythical tales and celestial beings, it remains a symbol of Cambodia's cultural heritage.



Lkhon Khol is a traditional masked dance-drama performed by male dancers, depicting scenes from the Reamker, Cambodia's version of the Ramayana. It combines elaborate masks, classical music, and melodic narration in a unique theatrical form.



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Intangible Cultural Heritage



Sbek Thom is a grand Khmer shadow puppet theatre dedicated to the divine. Using large, intricately carved leather puppets over 1.6 meters tall, performances are illuminated on a screen and brought to life with classical music and narration.



Bokator is an ancient Khmer martial art dating back to the first century, known for its powerful strikes, grappling, and weapon techniques. It promotes physical strength and mental discipline, rooted in a philosophy of non-violence.



Officially known in Khmer as Teanh Prot, meaning "pulling the rope," this traditional tug-of-war game is played during Khmer New Year. Symbolizing strength, unity, and renewal, it draws from Hindu mythology and represents cosmic balance and agricultural prosperity.



The Chapei Dang Veng is a traditional Cambodian two-stringed long-necked guitar, often used by storytellers and poets to accompany their narratives. Its music reflects the daily life, customs, and beliefs of the Cambodian people.



The Krama is a traditional Cambodian scarf, woven in checkered patterns from cotton or silk. Worn by all ages, it serves both practical and symbolic roles—from clothing and headwear to ceremonial use—embodying Cambodian identity and resilience.
