















# Regional Dialogue on Open Data in the Mekong Countries: Challenges and Opportunities

Date: Monday, October 27, 2025 Time: 8:00 AM – 4:30 PM

### Background

The Mekong region has seen significant growth in open data initiatives, reflecting a broader commitment by governments and civil society to promote transparency, accountability, and citizen engagement. Governments in these countries are actively developing policies and programs to support open data, aiming to strengthen public service delivery, facilitate evidence-based decision-making, and foster sustainable development. However, meaningful consultation with CSOs in policy development remains limited, presenting ongoing challenges. At the same time, civil society organizations, researchers, and key stakeholders are leveraging open data to inform advocacy, improve program effectiveness, and engage communities. Despite these advances, challenges remain, including issues of data accessibility, quality, standardization, and the effective use of data by CSOs and regional partners. Addressing these challenges and seizing emerging opportunities will be critical to realizing the full potential of open data in the Mekong region.

This dialogue brings together CSO representatives, regional experts, and Open Development Cambodia (ODC) partners and members of Cooperation Committee for Cambodia (CCC) to share experiences, discuss challenges, and identify opportunities for collaboration in open data across the Mekong countries.

## **Key Objectives**

- Share trends and developments in open data across the Mekong region
- Discuss challenges in implementing open data initiatives
- Identify opportunities for collaboration among CSOs and regional partners
- Strengthen regional networks and knowledge exchange on open data
- Collect and consolidate inputs from CSOs to inform the formulation of a collective CSO input report on the draft Open Data Policy for submission to the Ministry of Post and Telecommunications.

- Increased understanding of open data trends and challenges in the Mekong region
- Identification of practical steps for enhancing open data implementation
- Strengthened partnerships between ODC, regional CSOs, and other stakeholders
- Recommendations for future dialogues and collaborative initiatives

#### Questions for discussion:

- 1. Since there is no existing policy, what are the sanctions and correctives actions for ministries that fail to comply with the Open Data Policy's mandates for release and quality?
- 2. What can be the formal avenues for citizens to challenge a refusal to release open data?
- 3. Given that highly disaggregated data can risk re-identification and expose vulnerable individuals (indigenous communities or specific victims), what mandatory, multi-layered anonymization and data suppression protocols must the open data policy adopt to legally and ethically protect the privacy of small population groups while maximizing data utility?
- 4. What specific security and de-identification protocols must be included in the policy to protect sensitive data (personal data, data related to national security, and what is the definition these sensitive data)?
- 5. How can the policy explicitly (and/or implicitly) promote the release of disaggregated data to benefit marginalized groups?
